SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...has such an agency? I'm not aware of any agency that advocates for those who are quadraplegic, or paraplegic, or any other physically handicapped person. Are you?

SENATOR FOLEY: You're speaking of a state agency?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR FOLEY: Yeah. I...off the top of my head, I cannot think of another, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. I'm going to put my light on, because I want to pursue this a bit further by speaking, not just question and answer. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Vrtiska, followed by Senator Chambers.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thank you, Mr. President. I want to rise in support of Senator Foley's amendment, because I think it's important. All of us know that those who are handicapped because of sight...lack of sight certainly have a difficult time. And this is an opportunity for them that want to earn some money. And in talking to Senator Chambers, I'd like to tell him, you know, I think under our federal laws, you cannot deny a person employment because of a handicap if they can carry out the kind of work that you're trying to hire them for. That can't be an excuse not to hire somebody. And in being in government for many years, there are times when people come to apply for a job when they do have certain handicaps, but you can't use that as a reason not to hire them. And I think that's pretty much in statute. So whether there's an organization to protect those kind of people or to work for those kind of people, that's one issue. But the fact that you can't deny them employment is certainly another issue. And with that, I'll return the rest of my time back to the Chair. Thank you.
