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SENATOR TYSON: Now, you see, you've confused me and I've forgotten the question except to say, between now and Select, would you like to work on this with Senator Jensen and myself and come up with something that's perhaps more to your liking?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, and...but I want to talk a little more to help compile a record. In case we don't arrive at a resolution, I'd like to be able to pull the transcript and show the points that I was making so it won't seem that I'm making them up as I go along during our discussions.

SENATOR TYSON: It was Richard Brinsley Sheridan that mentioned that someone was indebted to his memory for his wit and his imagination for his facts, and every time I hear...think of that, I think of you, Senator Chambers. However, I'll go along with that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And it was the Chinese who said, the palest ink even 500 years old is more reliable than the best memory.

SENATOR TYSON: Thank you, Madam President.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Tyson. The next speaker is Senator Jensen.

SENATOR JENSEN: Thank you, Madam President. Members of the Legislature, boy, it's just amazing how much you can learn here just by listening to individuals. Really, I want to address a little bit about the increase. The reason for the increase was I believe in 1997 it was \$40,000, and certainly since 1997 costs have risen and so the \$80,000 was selected. And \$80,000 then as costs of living and expenses and materials and construction continues to go up...and, by the way, I've been in construction for...since 1960. I've never seen it go down, so it only goes one way and it continues to go up. But along with that, that is really the reason for that terminology in there, or increase, or can increase. And it was there so that, say, four years from now, three years from now, when the \$80,000 is a threshold, but that's extremely and unreasonably low, so maybe that \$80,000 needs to be raised to \$100,000 and or \$110,000 or \$120,000. That
