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sense to me.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Well, maybe Senator Tyson will speak of it. Thank you for your time.

SENATOR JENSEN: Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Beutler, Senator Jensen. Senator Preister, you are the next speaker. Senator Preister.

SENATOR PREISTER: I will...thank you, Honorable President. I'm sorry. I was being questioned about an amendment that I have upcoming. I wanted to yield my time to Senator Chambers, if he wants it, but Senator Chambers may...I guess he does want it. So I would yield my time to Senator Chambers.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Preister. Senator Chambers, 4 minutes and 30 seconds.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Preister. Thank you, Madam President. And I do want to work this bill a bit more today, because there's not too much more we're going to do, and I doubt that we're going to go to another major bill, so I want to make the use of the time and put some things into the record. This bill may have a very, very good purpose, and I'm going to concede something else. I cannot tell you here today how a court is going to rule in a specific case, so I want it clear that I understand that what I'm saying is based on my view of how a court might rule based on cases that I've read, not just that were handed down by the Nebraska Supreme Court, but other courts, including the U.S. Supreme Court. Congress cannot even inappropriately delegate its legislative authority. We have peculiarities in the Nebraska Constitution that are found in other state constitutions that restrict what we can do as a Legislature, but Congress is not similarly restricted. Congress has granted powers, and the U.S. Constitution is written in such a way as to give Congress all the power it needs to carry out the provisions of the constitution. So Congress can pass any kind of law that it wants. The only thing that will limit the impact of a congressional enactment is if Congress itself repeals that enactment, amends it or changes it, or if the U.S.
