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SENATOR JENSEN: Yes, I will.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Jensen, do you, as the Chairperson of the committee that heard this bill, have maybe a more definite idea of what this bill is for in addition to wiggle room? When the people testified for this bill, what did they seem to be saying they were trying to accomplish, or didn't they make it clear?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yeah. There were some communities who have been having difficulty with this bill the way it...before this bill was introduced, and those difficulties arose out of what...what and what amount of building permits and the permit to build a building had to have a engineers and architects seal. And so, because of that, they wanted some limitations as to certainly a residential house wouldn't need one. Typically that's done through...oh, you buy house plans. Many times builders draw up their own plans, and you don't need an architect seal or an engineer seal. Then there is a limitation on there also if anything under 5,000 square foot you don't need that architect or engineer scale...or seal. Those type of buildings are small. And then there...if you don't have...if you have less than 20 people or if it's less than 35-foot tall, again, you wouldn't need that seal. So certainly those in the real estate industry, those in the construction industry, it costs money if you have to obtain or buy or contract...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, let me, before my time run out, ask you a question.

SENATOR JENSEN: Sure.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And I see Senator McDonald's light on, so maybe she'll give me a chance...

SENATOR JENSEN: I'll turn my light on too so you...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Senator, we move from a dollar amount to square footage and to occupancy. Now, all three of those don't have to be taken into consideration when we're dealing with one structure, do they?
