SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Laugh) Especially when they're impertinent.

SENATOR TYSON: Yeah, I don't like them to be impertinent.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, okay. That's all I will ask you, Senator Tyson. Members of the Legislature, whenever a bill is before us and there is controversy, or the people on one side or the other perceive that there may be controversy, a letter of this type will be sent with all kind of unsupported statements to try to get us to see that that particular letter writer's position ought to prevail. So I would expect the builders to do everything they could to get the Legislature to allow them to function in a way to get the biggest bang for their buck; to make as much profit with as little expenditure in order to make that profit as possible. So when a person has a financial interest in the outcome of an activity, you have to learn to scrutinize very carefully that individual's position. It may be completely correct, but when you know that a person has a financial interest, you view it with a jaundiced eye. This is why judges are required to step down if there is the appearance of impropriety. Getting back to this letter, the person talked about 140 square feet being the dimensions of a structure which would require certain things to be done. Senator Tyson, being presumptuous and thinking that his view of the world is the only view of the world, said that is...I think he gave the wrong amount. Let me ask Senator Tyson what he said. Senator Tyson, would you answer a question?
