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Senator Jensen. It's directed towards constructional electricians, installing line voltage circuits and equipment in residential occupancies. So, again, that...your question there regarding the stereo information was stirred up, in my opinion, by this group from Indiana who...I don't know what's wrong with their representative, but I've never worked so hard with someone who is so, frankly, dense in my entire life.

SENATOR JENSEN: (Laughing) It seems like there are those around. Well, thank you for that information. I just wanted to make sure on the record anyway that we're not covering those...that low voltage type of equipment.

SENATOR BOURNE: Very legitimate question and this bill does not expand who is covered by the State Electrical Act. So you're exactly right. It's a correct assessment. They're not...

SENATOR JENSEN: Thank you.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Jensen. The Chair might have erred there. We're talking about Jensen and Janssen mixed up. Senator Janssen got up for Senator Jensen, but we'll let him...his light was on, so to make a long story short, Senator Janssen, you're recognized now to open on the committee amendments as Chairman of the General Affairs. I'm sorry about the Jensens and then the Janssens.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Are you sure, Senator Cudaback?

SENATOR CUDABACK: I think so.

SENATOR JANSSEN: All right. All right. The committee amendments to...which are AM2363, that's just a technical amendment. It clarifies the definition of commercial installation. To make it clear that the definition applies to all installations intended for commerce, so long as they are not in any of the dwellings covered in the new definition of residential installation. That is the committee amendments and I hope for the adoption of the committee amendments.
