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plate? Could you answer that for me?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Hudkins, would you respond?

SENATOR HUDKINS: We're not sure. We'll have to check and get back to you on that, Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Okay. Thank you, Senator Hudkins. I have been approached by one of my constituents of the problem of the handicapped license plates, permanently handicapped, and he has to go back and get that renewed every year, I believe. Senator Baker, could you help me with that?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Baker, would you respond?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes, I would.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Senator Baker, is that...do you...if you are permanently disabled, now do you have to renew that handicapped permit or license plate every four years to get that back again?

SENATOR BAKER: I think that's correct, yes, every four years.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Every four years you have...

SENATOR BAKER: Is that what you said, four years? I think that's correct. We'll check and make sure on that but I believe that's correct.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Have you ever had a bill in front of the committee, to your knowledge, to allow someone who is permanently disabled to have that license plate indefinitely, say for life?

SENATOR BAKER: I think the reason we recertify, that's a federal requirement to maintain some registries of disability handicapped drivers. We're...you kind of caught us off guard there. That's off the top of my head, I think that's right, but I'm not so sure it's four years. It may be five years, but it's a number of years to renew it with the doctor's statement, of course, and so on.
