SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, thank you for the information.

SENATOR BAKER: We'll find the answer. We'll get a solid answer for you here real quickly.

SENATOR JANSSEN: That would be fine. When I saw the bill coming up, I did remember this certain individual who keeps asking me about, you know, why do I have to get this renewed. I'm going to be this way the rest of my life. So, thank you, Senator Baker. We'll work on that over the interim.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Janssen. Senator Hartnett on the Beutler amendment.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. President, members of the body, Senator Baker, Senator Hudkins, we, in the Urban Affairs, have dealt with handicapped parking issues, and with the placard up and so forth, and the idea of the license, a person driving a car that's not handicapped, and that's why we went to the placard to control that, and if we continue to do this, you know, you'll have a handicapped parking and you...so is there any movement, Senator Baker or Senator Hudkins, to do away with the license plates themselves? Senator Baker.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Are you asking Senator Baker?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes, the question is whether we consider...

SENATOR HARTNETT: Is there any movement to do away with them because that's...because that was one of the issues we always have dealt with in Urban Affairs Committee is people who are driving with handicapped parking parking places and are not handicapped? And that's what I guess I...

SENATOR BAKER: I haven't followed this but I have...I would authorize comment in cases that I'm personally aware of, people will register cars with a handicapped plate and they have a spouse that, obviously, is not handicapped driving that car. And from time to time, that particularly handicapped spouse may not be with that person, although they still qualify for a
