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floor this afternoon, if that would be the case.

SENATOR PREISTER: So, Senator Schrock, you're saying unintended consequences for the small producer is the issue that you're concerned with?

SENATOR SCHROCK: That's the issue I'm concerned about. And I'd say I'm not clear on the issue, too, Senator Preister.

SENATOR PREISTER: Okay. And I would concur. It's a little fuzzy out there for lots of us. And, Senator Schrock, you can't commit for any of the other players, whether it's the Cattlemen or the Farm Bureau or the NDEQ. But in terms of working on some agreeable language, your intent is to work on this section of it to achieve the purposes of having a nutrient management plans available and updated, but that focus would...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time. Thank you, Senator Preister and Senator Schrock. Senator Burling. Is Senator Burling in the Chamber? Senator Burling has called the question. Do I see five hands? I don't. The next speaker would be Senator Hartnett.
