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because the language that would be left in the statute says "based on the best available technology"?

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Senator Chambers, you're interpreting that right. They could require them to use a technology that would just blow them out of the water and they couldn't comply.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now is it possible that the best available technology could be very inexpensive?

SENATOR SCHROCK: That is...that is very possible.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So we're kind of going in a circle. Everything is possible with the word "economically" in, and everything is possible without it. I'm going to...and that's all I will ask you because there's only about a minute or less now. I'm going to listen to the discussion, and I'm offering the amendment because I think we need to have it on this particular point. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. You've heard the opening on FA1564, which is an amendment to the Natural Resources Committee amendments to LB 916. Open for discussion on that amendment. Senator Schrock.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes, Mr. President, members of the Legislature, Senator Chambers, I know you're offering this amendment in good faith. We are using federal language on this amendment. I think it would be a mistake to take it out. You have had a lot of good suggestions. This one I happen to disagree with. Like I said, if you wanted to substitute the word "economical" and put in "practicable," that could be agreeable, but I think there is technology out there that is so expensive that it's not practical or economical to use it. And I'm not saying, if you took the word "economical" out, I'm not saying DEQ would demand that to take place, but you could interpret this bill that, say, there's some wonderful technology out there; trouble is it costs \$1,000 per head. Well, maybe that's more than the animals are even worth and they couldn't
