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We'll have a better idea of what those that are out there, and they're, by and large, big and they're, by and large, in many people's minds, going to be able to absorb these costs. Then there's a better idea as to who is going to pay. But in the process of getting there, you don't know who's going to have those federal permits and who won't, I just think it's not necessarily fair. And I'll admit it's a bias. It's not necessarily fair for a producer that has no way of passing these costs on, like every other thing in this...everyone in this list has, and that is the ongoing constant struggle between agriculture and the rest of the world, because the buck stops with us, just like it stops with the consumer, whether you're...if you buy gas, it's added on to the price of fuel at the pump. One way or the other, it's in the margin. And so I'm reluctant to go with this, not to say...and I'm not going to be here in a couple years, so I guess I can't promise to accommodate more of this. When we find out what the fee structure will be, how many federal permits there's going to be, then we can determine if there's...if it probably should go up. There is probably, instead of 100 percent, in many of our inspection areas it's 50-50 in Department of Ag, and perhaps that's a goal that would be more realistic down the road. But once again, there's no way to pass these on when you're a price taker, and unless...until we figure out a way for agriculture not to be a price taker, the buck is always...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...going to stop with those that pay. So that's my contribution to this debate. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator Louden, on the Beutler amendment.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Thank you, Senator Cudaback and members of the body. When I look at this bill here, I think that when you're trying to regulate...this is an industry, the livestock feeding or feeding of animals of any kind in there, and it's a certain type of an industry we have in Nebraska and it's one of the larger ones that's...has a huge economic impact on the whole state. And as we keep chiseling away, making them pay different
