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Because I don't want my word to be taken for what I'm going to ask you. Of the committee amendment I'm talking about. Are you with me?

SENATOR ERDMAN: Yes, sir.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Turn back to page 4, for the first thing, in line 9. We're talking about civil liability if the things that follow are engaged in. So do you see the term "civil liability" on line 9,...

SENATOR ERDMAN: Yes, I do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...page 4? All right. Then if we go to page 5 and enter line 3, do you see the words "in addition to," and continuing on the next line, "in addition to any other remedies that may be prescribed by law"? Do you see that language?

SENATOR ERDMAN: I do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What are those additional remedies not found in this bill that may be prescribed by law?

SENATOR ERDMAN: Well, on the civil side of things, I would imagine that there would be a number of administrative provisions of law that may be used as a remedy, if you will, for...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you don't know what they are at this...

SENATOR ERDMAN: No. I mean, I could...I'm sure we could probably get a list of whatever those possibly might be. But I think the intent on this side is not on the criminal side, but rather on the civil side, to say there may be other remedies besides the damages that are here that may be appropriate for this...such violation.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: We haven't got to damages yet.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Correct.
