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Are you there?

SENATOR ERDMAN: I am.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You beat me to the punch. That's because of the alacrity of youth. In lines 21 and 22, do you see "any civil or criminal remedy provided by law, including, but not limited to, the remedies provided in the act"? Do you see that language?

SENATOR ERDMAN: That is the language on lines 21 and 22.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So that would mean civil and criminal remedies outside of those listed in this act. Would you agree?

SENATOR ERDMAN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then if we go to page 12, in line 23, there is a discussion of contempt of court. Do you see that?

SENATOR ERDMAN: I do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And I think my time is up, so the next time...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Time, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...I'm recognized I will proceed. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Senator Erdman.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Members of the Legislature, I'm going to rise in opposition of the motion to recommit to the committee. I think it's appropriate for Senator Chambers to ask the body to do that. However, I believe that the will of the committee is to find a remedy to this situation and figure out what it is that we can do as lawmakers to ensure that the Medicaid dollars that we're spending, which are enormous and to the tune of billions, are done appropriately or done accordingly, and that there are remedies available for the state to recover damage in
