the event that those actions are not done accordingly. I have offered to work with Senator Chambers, both on the microphone today, as well as previously on this issue, and have yet to receive any recommendations. And I recognize that's his prerogative whether he would like to see the bill go forward or not. But some of the questions that do arise about how much we have in fraud in the state of Nebraska is unknown. We don't have the ability to say, well, this is what it is. We can look at other states that specifically doesn't deal with this area, but one of the areas that I have as an example was the state of Florida, which is obviously quite larger in population than ours, was losing \$1 billion a year before the lawmakers in that state began to crack down on fraud. And this comes out of the National Conference of State Legislatures' publication that they distributed to all members of this Legislature and throughout the nation. And when we start looking at what we are asked as lawmakers to do in the area of Medicaid, is provide the services that individuals in our state truly need, and to ensure that those who are providing those services are getting them in an appropriate time and at an appropriate cost. And that cost is obviously being discussed. But as we allow individuals to use dollars that weren't intended for them, it takes away from those who those dollars were truly intended for, which then also impacts the ability of the state to reimburse those facilities that are providing that care. And an example in that state was there was a clinic that billed Medicaid \$25 million over a year's time. And after they investigated, they found out that there was no such clinic. Pretty obvious fraud. That was done in coordination with the idea that they had a fraud control unit. And from that, they took the next step to develop the software and necessary tracking to ensure that the money is being spent appropriately. I would be willing, as a member of this Legislature, to sit down with Senator Chambers if he has concerns, to work these out. I have offered him that this morning. I will offer him that again this afternoon. I do believe, however, that it would be in the state's best interest to move forward with provisions in LB 1084 that allow us the opportunity to ensure that our Medicaid system is being administered correctly in the eyes of those who are receiving the services, to make sure that those individuals...and ironically, there may be situations where the Attorney General's
