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SENATOR JONES: Yes.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: And we had allowed \$11 million. It included some other things. My point is, I changed my mind after February 27.

SENATOR JONES: I understand that. And the way I commented earlier, I think down the road this needs to be funded some out of the General Fund, because this water is for everybody in the state. And I was wondering, maybe next year when you try to put the biennium budget together, will it be on the table to negotiate, to try to get some out then from the General Fund?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Well, things can change. I would agree with that. And frankly, I don't even have a problem right now. I've been asked. I wouldn't mind...I don't mind moving this to Select File under the present circumstances, till everyone understands and I see how the debate goes on the budget. We got...when I say "fragile," it's not dollars. There's fragile agreements. There's...our budget has run across several bills that have to pass or don't pass. And I'm very leery that letting \$1.5 million go here and \$1.5 million go there. We're going to be...start to talk real money and making our budget balance. That's what I'm concerned about, I'll lay it out right up front.

SENATOR JONES: Yeah, I understand that. But I just wanted to comment that maybe since next year we're going to have a biennium put together, that that could be back on the table and be discussed. Because I'd be really opposed to trying to put anything on wells, because I know my electric bill on the well, they just really jumped that this next year. So I'd be concerned about that, and I think everybody across the state would. As far as the Environmental Trust Fund, that would be available for now if we have to go that route. So we'll just have to see what it works out. But thanks for the comments anyway.
