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think the right thing is to do is put these place in a setting where they can have the kind of assurance that their life will be better, that they can get the help that they need, which even though it may be attempt, and certainly is attempt being made to do it now, this is the way I think that we need to go. Mr. President, could I ask Senator Jensen a question?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Senator Jensen, will you respond?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Senator Jensen, in looking at all the material that's been accumulated over the period of this process the last several years, somehow I've lost sight of it. Can you tell me how many states have a similar program that we're embarking on?

SENATOR JENSEN: Well, many states are...

SENATOR JANSSEN: One minute.

SENATOR JENSEN: ...in this transition, exactly where we are right now. There have been several states who have changed and gone to community-based services. Frankly, some of them have had problems. Others have done very, very well. And we want to alleviate those problems. We've looked at those and we think that we have a plan that can move forward without leaving anybody behind and provide more services.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thank you, Senator. You said exactly what I wanted you to say and that is, sure, there can be problems, and my desire, as you well know and I think everybody in this body knows, we want to make sure before we embark on this venture that all the parts are in place. And I think you understand that, I think the Governor, I think everybody who's involved with this understands the only way this can be done and be done successfully is have a plan for...thought out well and ahead, a plan. so that we don't stumble into something and then find out that there's so much opposition that is in fact true, that we will find ourselves in a situation nobody wants to be in. So I appreciate...
