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get issues in this body that are tough, very tough. We had one this morning that's very tough, deals with a very...I mean, of substance. Sometimes issues just pertain to you or me or the floors or the buildings or the highways or tax or this or that. This morning was water; this afternoon it's life, it's body, it's human beings. I mean, it's really, really tough. And there's some issues, like gambling, there's no right or wrong; it's kind of an arbitrary thing, you know. You support gambling? No. I support gambling? Yes. Those kind of issues are easy. I mean, it's a...boom, boom. Right to life issues, pro-choice issues, those are a mind-set. This is an issue that deals with human beings, and you have to do what is right, you have to do what you think is right. What does Jim Cudaback know about this issue? Absolutely nothing. It's an issue that I don't know...I won't admit that very often, as you know. I don't know anything about it. So we have to rely on people who know. And hopefully, like Senator Byars said, we have people that have studied the issue and give us references, 50 or 60, whatever. The Governor, I hope he's done his homework. I know Senator Jensen has, and the committee. They've done a lot of...I mean, it's tough work. So on this one here, I don't usually cop out, whatever that word means, but usually I don't. I'll stand up and say, this...but this time I'm going to go on what somebody else tells me and what somebody else does, somebody that knows. Jim Cudaback doesn't know anything about it. Maybe the rest of you do. I don't know anything. It's not an arbitrary thing. We have to do what is right. I've been...I've gotten more letters, more calls, more on this issue than anything else this year. Seems like hundreds. Maybe I haven't, but...yeah, it has been hundreds of letters and calls. I couldn't even answer them all, and I apologize for that. Letters, letters, letters. And that's fine. I'm going to rely on my fellow colleagues to tell me what do do on this here. So that's it. I'm copping out here. I don't know anything. I'm going to vote. So be sure and you do what's right, because if you don't, the burden is on you. And the Governor, Senator Jensen, other colleagues in this body that know something, like the Health and Human Services Committee, have studied it. I think Senator Cunningham has probably looked at it, Senator Burling has probably looked at it, and people have spent a lot more time than I have. But anyway, one of those tough, tough
