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SENATOR COMBS: Well, the Assertive Community...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR COMBS: ...Treatment program funding.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I cannot speak to that off the top of my head.

SENATOR COMBS: Okay. All right. Thank you. Thank you. I'll try to get an answer later. Time?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Your time is up, Senator. Sorry.

SENATOR COMBS: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Combs. Senator Bromm, FA1573.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. First of all, I want to, as everyone else has as well, commend Senator Jensen and the Governor and others for taking this issue on, the committee, because there probably isn't another issue that's any more important than this in the Legislature this year, or probably haven't had any more important issue for a number of year. So it's terribly important. The...part of the...I think, of the reason for some objection and some concern here is that whenever you make a proposal that envisions closing significant structures and facilities and services in a community, you're going to raise a lot of question. And it's a shock, I think, to those that are impacted. And when you're dealing with the mental health area and health and human services area, there's immediately concerns about, not the intentions, but whether or not the road map and the plans that are envisioned actually will happen. So there's an understandable initial reaction, I think, by some people and by the communities that are impacted. Now in response to that, I think Senator Jensen in particular, and the committee, and the Legislature, have worked very, very hard to try to alleviate concerns and try to provide, as clear as you can, a road map for how this is going to happen. But still there is some lack of trust, I think, and not lack of trust in
