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medical schools? They're both in Omaha. That's where our family practitioners are going to be given their instruction in mental health disease. That's where our psychiatrists are going to be trained. That's, in fact, where virtually all the main members of our mental health teams are going to come from. Yet Omaha has virtually no facilities. We take them to Norfolk instead. As Senator Jensen mentioned, 70...60 to 70 percent of the people in Norfolk are from Omaha. The Olmstead decision, I think, is alive and well, and might be added to our other troubles. One of the things that I think that we need to talk about a little bit is this: Hastings and Norfolk are now our outstate leaders in mental health. I would suggest that they have the greatest number of good people in the mental health care field. And I think...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR JOHNSON: ...that rather than slowing down the process here, they ought to be out front leading us to this new direction. We've heard that there's no plan. There most certainly is a very basic plan. There is an oversight committee that will be running this plan to make sure it goes. We have that this oversight committee will report back to the Legislature, but this isn't enough. We went a few steps further than that, to guarantee that there would be legislative oversight. But what we are told is, we've got to have a...pass the same bill next year. I haven't been here very long, but I think that's a little unique. I would suggest...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR JOHNSON: ...that we don't have just a good plan, but we are planning a functional system. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Johnson. Senator Erdman, followed by Senators Schimek, Landis, Connealy, Thompson, and others. Senator Erdman.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Thank you, Mr. President. About an hour and a half ago I pressed my light, thought I'd be a part of the chorus, but I guess I'm the lone singer in this group now. As a
