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SENATOR ERDMAN: Some facility that would...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay.

SENATOR ERDMAN: ...house those individuals or would provide them the care. But we have a list of not only the inpatient services, if you will, but the crisis response teams and the things that are being done in addition to that.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay. You answered the question and what I wanted to know, because I'm still concerned about those folks that are still going to have to come down to Lincoln or whatever. But...

SENATOR ERDMAN: As am I.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...you did answer my question.

SENATOR ERDMAN: As am I.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Mr. President, members, I still have questions. And I...there's never enough time up here in five minutes to get those questions answered, and at the rate we're going, I'm never going to get them answered. But if I could, Senator Jensen, are you engaged somewhere on the floor? Oh, okay. Well then I'll go on to something else. I would like to ask Senator Jensen about the particular amendment that we're on. You know, after I spoke last time, I was called out into the lobby, and some of the providers and some of the members of NAMI were out there, and they were telling me that basically this is a chance that they have waited for for a long time. And some of those people have changed their tune over the last few months. But they understood where I was coming from when I said I'm concerned. And this follows up what Senator Bromm said a little bit, too. You know, some of us are just not quite ready to trust, because we've done that before, and people have gotten burned. And I told them out there, I said, you know, I don't really like to gamble. And they thought that was kind of amusing. But I don't like to gamble with people's lives. I mean, we're really, really talking about people's lives here.
