have to be done, and then dealing with it separately from the budget on its own and it would not become a roadblock or a sticking point?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I would. I'm not sure how you're going to do that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, I would just strike it with this amendment.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Would that accomplish what...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then...it would take it out of the budget, then we could discuss whether or not it ought to be put back in, and that way I would abide whatever the outcome of that vote would be. In other words,...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: In other words, you want 25 votes to put it in, rather than 25 to take it out?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, but see, I'd have to get my 25 to take it out at this point but that wouldn't be a permanent vote. But if I don't get my 25 to take it out, then I've got to do some massaging and some manipulating to persuade my colleagues that there is a better way to deal with the budget than getting hung up on the State Fair proposition. And here's what I'm telling you; we take it out now. That shows your good faith. When the attempt is made to put it back in, I will argue the best that I can to prevent that from happening. But if it is decided to put it back in, then I will abide by that vote.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I don't under...I guess I don't understand why you want two votes instead of one.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, then if you will vote to just take it out, and that's it, that would be nice. So let me ask you a question. I thought I was getting around to something. Are you opposed to the amendment that I am proposing now?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, I would be.
