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SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Bourne, you have almost five minutes.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Thompson, members. Senator Chambers says that I got us here. Well I didn't file the amendment. I just simply expressed my opposition to it. And he's going to do what he's going to do. And I...and you know, Senator Preister's argument is compelling. I can't disagree with that. It's a little more diplomatic than Senator Chambers might have put it. But you know, I don't know. Originally, I did think that this was money going to bricks and mortar and trying to prop the structure up. But now...and I'm not capitulating, because I'm still going to vote no on Senator Chambers' amendment. But I did not realize it was for ribbons when I initially spoke. But I think the points that I made earlier are true. If it isn't this issue, it's another issue. And that's all right. I guess we're going to do what we're going to do. I did find Senator Preister's comments compelling. But I still will probably vote no on this amendment. Would Senator Wehrbein yield to a question or two?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you yield, Senator Wehrbein, to a question?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you. And I hope Senator Tyson is not offended, but I do want to ask some questions about the budget, rather than continue to discuss whether or not Senator Chambers is going to follow through with his threats, because I do believe he will. Senator Wehrbein, I want to talk about the Affordable Housing Trust Fund. And what we're doing there, I remember we had some significant debate on that a couple of years ago, and we had taken some money on a temporary basis. And if you remember, that's from the documentary stamp that goes into an affordable housing, and we build apartments for poor people, and that.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR BOURNE: And it says a total...on page 20, it says a total of \$2 million per year is reallocated from the Affordable
