Luedtke, and some other people. And then he got around to Senator Chambers. He said, you know--and I got to tell you this, because it's public, it was on the air--he said, Chambers...Senator Chambers is probably the most intelligent individual I've ever met. He has the best grasp of this body of anybody I've ever seen around this place. And he went on talking about Senator Chambers and some of the good things he'd done, and a few of the bad things. But he said, you know, Senator Chambers is not always right, but he never accepts it when he's wrong. But I will say this--and this is Senator Terry Carpenter talking--Senator Chambers has been along...around a long time, and I will make a prediction: he will never change. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. Senator Redfield.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. I rise not to address the amendment before us, but to respond to Senator Bourne and his questions about the Affordable Housing Trust and the funds that would be diverted to rental assistance for those with a serious mental illness. There was a bill introduced in the Health Committee. It was LB 931. You can check your computer to look at that. It was a bill that was advanced by the committee unanimously. It did have a public hearing. I introduced it. And it is a part of the package of the mental health reform. The Governor originally was asking for \$3.5 million a year, and he has agreed to divert \$1.5 million to the General Fund that was his agreement with the Appropriations Committee. So what you are seeing reflected in the budget bill is actually a part of LB 1083 if we adopt the amendment for this rental assistance. So this has had a public hearing, and it has been minimized from the original proposal. I will tell you that there were those who did speak with me before the bill's hearing, and were concerned about there being enough assets left in the Affordable Housing Trust. And we did discuss whether in fact next year we would look at the documentary stamp tax, but that was not in the public hearing and we declined to change that at this time. Thank you, Mr. President.
