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year after we see about the...if there's increase in parolees, if we truly need those. Now remember, there's more prisoners coming into the system with meth and the drug-related. And, I mean, the papers alone, Lincoln and Omaha, particularly the Omaha, are full of criminal activities nearly every day. Those are constantly coming into the system, so I think it's premature at this point to try to react to LCC. We recommended it be open. There were several reasons, and I can't remember them all off the top of my head, but there are several facilities out there that are used--administrative, cafeteria, some support facility that are part of it that are very necessary. It's the same as it was a year ago. But I don't think it will be wrong to look at it next year, and perhaps if we've added additional parolees there will be space. But remember, I was going to bring up the current prison population, but we are still over 100 percent of capacity, by well over 100 percent of capacity. So I think that time is coming. It's not here yet. So Senator Chambers' points are well-taken. I believe that's a proper function for next year, full 90-day session. There can be an opportunity for amendments to be introduced. Further, LB 46 will be further along. That's the corrections bill. We will have a chance to see if the increased probation has worked, if there is...recidivism stays the same or even goes down, or will it go up, those kinds of things. There will be probably a little better opportunity to understand the results of what we've done so far.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President, members. Would Senator Wehrbein yield to a question or two?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Senator Wehrbein, will you respond?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Just two, Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: (Laugh) Thank you. Say, I want to discuss a little bit the Cash Reserve Fund, and again, we had talked about that earlier.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay.
