Pedersen, Dwite, spoke earlier this morning about an issue that I had discovered from the Corrections Department, and that was I had earlier been told earlier this year, when I returned to session, I asked had Corrections made some cuts in their budget, and I was told, yes, they'd cut \$13 million. When I went to tour LCC and visit with the inmates and workers there a couple weeks ago, I was told essentially what Senator Dwite Pedersen had said this morning, that this was sock money, money that had not been used that had been appropriated. And I wondered if Senator Wehrbein could just help clear something up for me, if he would yield.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you yield, Senator Wehrbein, to a question?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR COMBS: Is this...is this, in fact, so? Do you remember in Corrections, when they came before your committee, did they actually have \$13 million that they did not use and give back?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, and I will say I would think it's not correctly called sock money.

SENATOR COMBS: Okay. Excuse me, I was just quoting.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: It...I will read it. On page 23 there is an analysis of this as to what. Inmate medical expenditures are expected to be less than anticipated due to, one, delays in implementation of provisions of LB 154; overestimating the number of inmates needing referral to an infectious disease specialist for hepatitis C versus (sic) treatment; negotiated savings in the development of hospital contracts through discounts with hospital systems in Omaha and Lincoln; and established a strict drug formula with nonformulary (nonprescription) medication. They did bring those things. I don't have the testimony here, but I think this...a lot of this repeats that testimony that we had, and I would get a copy of that, but that is the reason. Because a year ago we were anticipating fairly significant medical costs because of the trend at that point and, I mean in a nutshell, that is...in that
