SENATOR RAIKES: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Legislature. I would like to follow along a little bit with what Senator Beutler was talking about with my attempt to try to get an overview of what the committee is recommending, not specifically on the issue he was talking about, but on, rather, if you look at page 7 you see that there are a number of new initiatives undertaken in the Appropriations Committee recommendation. And you've got a sheet, I think that's around now, that has Appropriations Committee Recommendations on the Use of Health Care-Related Cash Funds. For my own information, I was interested in just how is it that all of this is being made to work, and I hope if I've not done this correctly that someone will point out where the errors are. But basically, the overview is that we're taking about 24.8, or the committee is recommending that we take about \$24.8 million out of healthcare-related cash funds. That's indicated at the top of this sheet. There are two what are called distributive funds, at least on this sheet--intergovernmental transfer and tobacco settlement. Together, they amount to about \$263 million. There is a proposed one-time withdrawal of \$10.3 million from those funds. The expending funds...let me back up. The distributive funds are the ones that receive the money, like from the tobacco settlement, and then the money is taken from there and put into the expending funds. That's the Health Care Cash Fund and the Tobacco Prevention and Control. Now, the...if you go to page 7 of the blue book, you notice "cash" written there in the current biennial budget about four times, and I think this will tell you, hopefully...the intention of this sheet is to explain exactly where that cash money is coming from. The bottom half of the sheet shows how this total of \$24.8 million of withdrawn money, if you will, is to be used in the committee recommendation, and it's done two ways. One of them is the summary of use by the fund source. And, for example, from the IGT Fund, part of it goes to child welfare initiatives, the biennium total of \$7.8 million. Part of it goes for emergency protective services associated with LB 1083. That's another \$2.5 million. That's where the \$10.3 million goes, or the \$10.3 million withdrawn from the Intergovernmental Transfer Fund. Okay. Then, in addition, you've got money from that Health Care Cash Fund, and this is just sort of taking an extra
