right place? I didn't think so. It also has...had given grants to various other places what...that...I remember the...a factory that made toilet paper for the prison. They got some of the grant money and they employed a lot of people at this place. But we, you know, and it all depends upon who is...who is writing for those grants. I know on the education side, if you have a...if you have a very good grant writer in your school that makes a difference, but not every school can have someone of that quality that's able to get these funds. But I want you to remember what the people of this state, when they enacted the lottery, this is where those monies were going to go. And the sad thing is, four or six years from now there won't be anybody left in this Legislature that knows the history of this. Term limits will take care of that. That's beyond our control at the present time. The people of this state decided they wanted term limits. They've got it. And it's going to take about ten years for them to realize what that decision...the implications that decision is going to have on this state. I, for one, would like to protect, protect the environmental part of it and the education part of the lottery proceeds. I know we are in economic bad tough times right now and we're grasping at everything we can to find an extra dollar to keep the state from going bankrupt. But these times have happened in prior years. It's happened...it seems like it happens about every 10 or 12 years. And things will turn around. We'll get back on track. But I hate to see us using these dollars for General Fund dollars. I know it has to be done, but, darn it, we have to...have to remember, and I hope that someone will come back and look at the legislative record in years to come and see what we were talking about here today, the road we're going down, trying to keep the state from going bankrupt. But I hope that we can...I hope that we can, someday, within my term here, turn this around and get it back to where it should have been in the first place. That's one good thing about having a little pot sitting back there that we can...we can grasp into, and I don't want to say rob, but go and regroup some of these funds for other purposes. I don't like it, but that's something we're going to have to do now, you know.
