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environment in our General Fund, but money does go to the environment. So I'm troubled by this and, actually, I'm going to work on having some parity here. Either we take it, the entire thing, from both components, or we leave both components alone. I don't think it's right that we take from one. I don't even know how that happened, if the education community acquiesced and gave in and decided to participate in the budget problems and the environmental folks said, no, we're not going to. I don't even know how this transpired. And maybe this doesn't trouble...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR BOURNE: ...anybody else, but I see an inequity here.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bourne. Senator Wehrbein, followed by Senators Chambers, Beutler, Maxwell.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Mr. President, members, I...we're going to another issue at 11:00 and I have some desire to move along a little bit, so I'd like to give some of my time to Senator Raikes.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Raikes.

SENATOR RAIKES: Thank you, Mr. President. Thanks, Senator Wehrbein. I very much appreciate the discussion. We'll continue to work on this issue, but, Mr. President, I'd like to withdraw this amendment at this time.

SENATOR CUDABACK: The amendment is withdrawn. We're now back to discussing the Appropriations Committee amendments, AM3075, to LB 1091. Continue discussion, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'd like to ask a question of "Chicken Little."

SENATOR CUDABACK: Who?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Raikes.
