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SENATOR JENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And then it was dropped down to what amount?

SENATOR JENSEN: Well, there was absolutely nothing. However, through Senator Landis last year coming up with a fund that was able to render about \$400,000 into that for one year.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So it was decided that \$2,500,000 ought to be put in place as a permanent source of funding for this program with which you're offering here?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes, to keep it ongoing.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Why not \$7 million, as initially?

SENATOR JENSEN: Well, certainly we looked at that. And there's a sheet that's going around that...the coalition actually came up with \$5 million, and then they had projections on \$3 million. We thought it would be more palatable, and still keep the program going, still having an effect, of \$2.5 million. And so that was the figure that was used.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do Creighton and the University of Nebraska Medical Center and maybe some money to the university itself for research, do they get money out of this Tobacco Settlement Fund?

SENATOR JENSEN: The...in the form of grants they may. Most of this, however, will be for teenagers, with some smoking cessation, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I don't mean smoking cessation.

SENATOR JENSEN: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Creighton and the Medical Center, and if I'm not mistaken, some money to the UNL campus, do they get some money on an annual basis from those funds?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes.
