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the divvy, or the divide, of the money, rather than carve it off the top? And if, in fact, you think you have money enough so that that total divvy could be \$52.5 million instead of \$50 million, why don't you do it that way?

SENATOR JENSEN: You know, a lot of it is political, believe that or not.

SENATOR RAIKES: Really?

SENATOR JENSEN: (Laugh) That wouldn't surprise you. If we would say, okay, we're going to take \$2 million out of there, and then we got all of the others complaining, you're taking what you agreed you would not do, or say we raised the amount from \$50 million to \$52,500,000 a year. We have, again...the university would like to increase their research dollars, DED would like to increase. Certainly some of our other health agencies would like to increase. And so we thought, let's do this carve-out, so that in the future it's always there, and at some point in time then, when we can afford, perhaps, to give more in health care, that we'll do that.

SENATOR RAIKES: But let me ask you, why, if I'm in the divvy now, why would I think--and you're tobacco cessation--why would I want to keep you out and give you money off the top before the base program is funded, rather than have you come into the group and, okay, we share and share alike? I don't understand the political reasons there.

SENATOR JENSEN: Well, certainly, and I understand what you're saying, that they be part of the mix like everyone else. But I come back to the same thing that I started out with, that when we received the tobacco settlement dollars, they were to help with a tobacco program and smoking cessation. That's the reason there's the settlement. You've got to remember, when the attorney generals filed suit on the tobacco companies, it was because of the health care costs of tobacco; no question about it, health care costs of tobacco. And so the settlement was made that we would use dollars to prevent particularly children and others, help them with...
