certainly is necessary for us to accomplish. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'll yield my time back to the Chair.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Byars. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, Senator Johnson summed up where I will be on this amendment. I'm going to support it. I definitely would like to see the \$7 million. But since the first major step that's being taken by Senator Jensen's amendment the way it is drafted is to make this amount permanent, that is a very good start. Then we might be able even to work with Senator Raikes to show where perhaps more money is justified. But before anything will be done about changing the way LB 692 allocates money, there has to be some pressure somewhere to show that such a move might be wise. I don't think there would be a change in that formula just by saying we ought to change it so we can do something over here. We should do the righteous thing, which is what Senator Jensen's amendment will do. And I hope that Senator Raikes comes away with one of those votes of the kind that I am so accustomed to receiving. We express what we genuinely believe, we make the best argument that we can, then we take our lumps. We pick ourselves up, dust ourselves off, and start all over again. But I want Senator Jensen to know that despite what I had said about wanting that full \$7 million, I would do nothing to derail this amendment, nor will I try to go into some other things at this point. Thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President, members. Over the last year or so, we've had some extensive discussions regarding the money that's going into the Tobacco Prevention Fund, I think, if that's the name of it. And last year, the year before, I think it was Senator Raikes, actually, that had taken the money out of the smoking cessation program, and I supported him when he did that. And I truly regret that vote. I...as time has gone on and I've gotten more information, I've become convinced that this program really does good things. I talked on the floor before. I expressed disappointment that the Department of HHS used a Utah company to do the smoking
