there isn't anybody that you talk to that's going to want their taxes raised. You talk to your school people; they say, don't cut us. Don't...and don't give us any more property taxes, your property tax people say the same thing. But believe me, we have to keep the state functioning appropriately. The...if we don't do this, if we don't consider this and we say, we don't want to raise that tax, what are we going to do? How are we going to solve these problems that we have? I think it would be appropriate to move this amendment along and see if we as a body can decide some other way besides this to fund our financial concerns. The Appropriations Committee put in the \$160 million low-level waste site. The Revenue Committee decided not to fund that. Now, how many things are we going to decide not to do this year? I think we start to have to decide to do things, and the buck does stop here. I think we have to be realistic. We don't want to raise the taxes, but how are we going to pay for our state government? I think we have a responsibility and I don't think we can say, well, I'm in favor of education, therefore, I can't do this, I can't do that. I think we have to look at it realistically and say, we have to do what we have to do in order to sustain our state government. We've been making substantial cuts. We can't keep going back to the drawing board on cuts. We have to start being realistic that we need a long-term source of revenue. You look at that green sheet and you see. According to this, we'd be \$159 million below the reserve, and in the future we'd be \$195 million below the reserve. Add \$160 million on top of that, take away the \$100 million that we're talking about here, and you see where we are. We have to...we have to be responsible, not just for this year, but we have to be responsible for the biennium coming up next year. We have to know what we can do, and we have to have an alternative. Now hopefully, and we do see signs that there is an improvement in our economy, but if it doesn't improve then we have to have some place we can go to keep the state functioning. If it does improve then we don't have to exercise the \$1.10. This is an optional thing. I know it's always hard to say, well, we don't need to do this right now so let's don't do it. But I think we need to do it from the standpoint of the local schools. I think they need to have an alternative saying, okay, we'll do our...we'll do our report, we'll do our certification of funding, and then the good news is if we cannot
