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Louisiana. And when he was serious, he said "ga-ron-tee." Well, I will "ga-ron-tee" that if Senator Wehrbein's amendment is adopted this morning stark terror will take over enough of those who voted for it that by the time it comes up on Select File we will strip it so fast we might take 30 percent of the rest of the bill with it. That amendment being offered by Senator Wehrbein is not going to last. Whatever happens on General File on this bill may not be permanent, just as the things we did or refrained from doing on the other budget bills that we advanced cannot be considered to be final decisions. We just moved it along, delayed the real fight. On this bill, I'm not going to support Senator Wehrbein's amendment. I'm not going to support the committee amendment. Now when we were talking on the budget bill, the mainline budget bill, and I wanted to get rid of the money going to the State Fair, what I had said is that on the issue of the State Fair I will not dig my heels in if and when Senator Wehrbein would offer a motion to restore that money. I did not say I would not fight against the rest of the appropriations bill. I did not say I wouldn't dig my heels in on other bills. I am opposed to our pitching and patching, robbing one fund this year, a different fund next year without looking at a permanent way to bring money into the General Fund. I think the way to do it is by raising the income tax. Senator Brown reemphasized for me why that is the proper way to go. Her rich friends are squealing like pigs with their noses stuck under a gate. Tax that man...wait a minute, don't tax me, don't tax you, don't tax me, tax that fellow behind the tree. Well, those are the rich people saying tax everybody except them. Her friends were given consideration...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...way back with LB 775. Not only could the corporations not pay taxes, not only could they get money from not worry about paying taxes for the mainframe computers and jet planes and all the other things, there were benefits given to their high-paid executives who get paid off in other ways than the cash that you and I get. So they have been well taken care of, and I don't think it's going to be inappropriate or in any way unjust to let them pay a little of the way that they ought to. Thank you, Mr. President.
