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SENATOR CHAMBERS: And you have your way and I have my way. Is that true?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: That's unequivocally true.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would you agree that there ain't no good guy, there ain't no bad guy, there's only you and I and we just disagree?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: I would so stipulate.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now since your plan doesn't have much of a chance at all, if it failed, would you support mine?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: (Laugh) I reject the underlying premise and probably wouldn't support yours unless it served to tighten the box so to speak.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Thank you, Senator, and, Mr. President, thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Don Pederson.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, interesting thing happened. I went over and met those people that are responsible for watching out for Senator Cudaback since I haven't been able to do it in several years in the Appropriations Committee. I would like to once again remind you of the fact that we on the Appropriations Committee had to come up with an answer. We are asking you to help us implement an answer. I don't think there's anybody that's in favor of taxes, and I think we can all decry what effect it may have on everyone specifically. But I think it's our responsibility to come up with an answer, not just to decry all of the concerns about what is bad about various proposals. I'm sorry to hear Senator Chambers give the death sentence to Senator Kermit Brashear's proposal. I thought I was interested in that. I'd like to hear more about it. I yield the balance of my time to Senator Brashear.
