SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, if you want to see what this amendment is, put that little arrow on "amendments considered" and hit it, and you will see AM3027, with Senator Wehrbein's name next to it. If you look...then make that come up on your gadget. In the...in line 3, when you get over to the end of the line, you see the word "ten." Senator Wehrbein felt that what is being presented by the committee amendment is betwixt and between. Well, I'm offering another "tweener." Rather than take the 10 cents of Senator Wehrbein, I'm going to offer you 7 cents. I don't think this bill ought to move in the shape it's in with just the committee amendment. I'd like to ask Senator Raikes a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Raikes, would you respond?

SENATOR RAIKES: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Raikes, if the committee amendment is adopted and the bill would move, and that should be the final form of the bill, will the problem that is being addressed by that bill be completely solved? Or is this a portion of the solution?

SENATOR RAIKES: It would not be completely solved, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If what is being offered now by this amendment that I put on the desk were to be adopted, which of the two would come the closer to helping solve the problem--the committee amendment, or this one that is now on the desk?

SENATOR RAIKES: The amendment that you have offered would, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And Senator Raikes, it...seven is between ten and five, isn't it?

SENATOR RAIKES: I think so. Yes, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So in a way, although it's not exactly that, this could be looked at as somewhere in between the committee
