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with whatever we do on General File, as I've said before. If you vote down this amendment, it doesn't trouble me at all, and I will not take umbrage at it. The only thing it will do if you vote it down is put me in a position to not have to try to find any middle ground on any other aspects of the bill. And maybe that's what some who will vote against this amendment would like to see, because they know that if I decide that I'm going to resist the bill, I will do it, as nobody else will. But maybe I won't. We'll have to wait and see. I don't know that anybody expected me to offer this amendment, because this morning I did not expect to offer it myself. As a matter of fact, when we were voting on Senator Wehrbein's amendment, I didn't expect to offer this. As a matter of fact, the second when Senator Raikes began to discuss the committee amendment is when I began to think about another possible alternative. The committee amendment is not going to solve the problem. The committee amendment will not take us as close to a solution as this amendment. If the bill is advanced, with or without the committee amendment, with or without this amendment, that is not going to be the last word on that bill. So maybe some people will feel that it will be less painful to discuss the bill if it has a committee amendment with \$1.05, and having to push it back up to \$1.10, it will be easier to do it if you go from a nickel to a dime. But I'm not going to try to figure out what people are thinking. Here's what I will say. Others with whom I was in league this morning have not necessarily had a change of mind in the way that I have. I have to understand, they're expressing opposition to this amendment. Earlier, I would have resisted it also. I will resist the committee amendment if this is not adopted, because the committee amendment is virtually nothing as far as a solution to the problem goes. This takes us beyond the committee amendment, toward a possible solution. Nothing on the table now, or that was on the table, will completely solve the problem. The question to be answered is, how close will we approach to a solution while looking at the issue on General File? Some people, apparently, want to be a greater way from the solution than they would be if this amendment were adopted. Adopting this amendment does not bind anybody. It does not set anything in concrete. It's a movement down from where Senator Wehrbein was, but a movement up from where the committee amendment is, and it will take us closer to
