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SENATOR VRTISKA: That's right. These are carryovers that were not...they were there and we have not dealt with them yet, so we're forced to deal with them this year.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: They had actually been filed before we passed the legislation.

SENATOR VRTISKA: That's my understanding.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay. Okay. Well, I know that it was...I know that it was somewhat controversial at the time. And I don't know if you have something else that you would like to add to that, Senator Vrtiska. I just saw somebody hand you a note. Did you have something else that you wanted to add to that? I just saw somebody hand you a note.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, this is...this is a correction that I made, this that's coming up, but...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Oh, okay.

SENATOR VRTISKA: ...doesn't (inaudible) do with (inaudible).

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay. Thank you very much.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Preister, on AM3256.

SENATOR PREISTER: Thank you, Honorable President. Members of the body, I would just like to underscore Senator Vrtiska's comments. I do serve on the Business and Labor Committee and did attend the committee hearing, and want to state that the three denied claims, as Senator Vrtiska described them, were for warrants that were issued, and those warrants expire after a year. So these companies received the warrants and after a year they did not have them cashed. They then applied to have them reissued, but it was beyond the expiration limit. One company got a second warrant and that warrant was sent to them, and a year went by and it still wasn't cashed and so it expired too. So the committee, just as Senator Vrtiska said, wanted to send a message that if this money is important to you, at least cash
