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reduced to a judgment. The Attorney General has settled some matters and submitted a claim for the state to pay, which the committee does, and I support those things, generally. The ALR cases were different because the factors were different. But I would like to ask Senator Preister a question or two, because I see Senator Vrtiska is busy and I think Senator Preister can answer these questions.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you yield, Senator Preister?

SENATOR PREISTER: Yes, I will.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Preister, was a picture of the car presented to the committee?

SENATOR PREISTER: I don't recall seeing a picture of the car.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Was there a statement presented to the committee of an estimate from a repair shop?

SENATOR PREISTER: There was an estimate from the repair shop, and that was in the amount of 8,700 and some dollars. I don't remember the exact amount.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And the car wasn't worth that much itself, was it?

SENATOR PREISTER: Well, an old car, if it's in good condition, doesn't necessarily equate to what a blue book may say as a general rule for an old car. This one was a very nice car and the kind of car that may have held its value more than an average...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Excuse me, because of my time. How do you know it was a nice car?

SENATOR PREISTER: I'm taking their word for it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Preister. Somebody comes in. They had an old car. They alleged damage that has not been proved. There is not even a photograph of the vehicle, but
