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support of Senator Chambers' amendment. I would note, however, and I think Senator Chambers knows this, a couple of these individuals that are listed in this \$41,000 have since deceased, and I suspect there's no way. But, as I understand it, Senator Chambers' amendment doesn't necessarily say we're going to try to collect it. It's just going to leave their names on record, as I understand it. Is that correct, Senator Chambers?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's correct.

SENATOR VRTISKA: So actually what we're doing is, basically, letting the world know that these people are not as honorable maybe as they pretend to be, and I think that's probably a good description of what's happened here when they owed in fines \$25,000, almost \$26,000, and their wealth would certainly allow them to take care of that if they wanted to. So I'm going to support Senator Chambers' amendment because I think it's the right thing to do. And with that, thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. Senator Louden.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. I was wondering if Senator Chambers would yield to a question.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, would you yield?
