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SENATOR JENSEN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. And first of all, I want to thank all those that participated in this: Senator Cunningham, Senator Burling, Senator Connealy, Senator Tyson, who have I missed here, Senator...oh, yes, Senator Combs. Thank you. These have been tough decisions and tough negotiations. The communities of Norfolk and Hastings have a 100-year history in providing mental health services. I hope that doesn't go away. Matter of fact, those employees that are there, I hope, will be employees of the new redesign. A job check might come from a different entity, but they have expertise, they have experience, and they have long been in the field of mental health and providing behavioral health substance abuse, so that is very important to me and I hope that we can continue that. Along with these negotiations, there's always give and take on both sides, but it's good when you deal with honorable people, that you can come to negotiations and work through these issues. The essence of where we are and what we're talking about...and by the way, we are handing out to you just a chart that tells you how the oversight and how all of the safeguards are built into this measure. It is certainly, as community-based services are brought up, we should be able to do a smooth transition, and it's certainly my desire that that would happen. But along the way, we have checks, we have some opportunities to evaluate the process and to see that it is continuing properly. This is a very important measure. This is something that's been going on, not for a decade but for many decades, and I hope that this will bring us to a new way of delivering mental health care throughout the state of Nebraska. In essence, as we work through the downsizing of the regional centers, and as community-based centers are being brought up throughout the entire state, and we have that local control of six service regions across the state that are elected by...or that are...that is formed by county officials, and they best know within their own region what is best for their individuals, and there are no two regions that are alike. The real essence of the bill, and I hope it's on your computer by now, comes in Section 6 (sic). And what that says, and I'm just going to read it for you, it says: When the occupancy of a regional center reaches 20 percent or less of its licensed capacity, the division will notify the Governor, the Legislature of such fact.
