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will it...it can't lessen the fiscal impact. It has to cost the state more to conform with this amendment. Would that be a fair statement?

SENATOR JENSEN: Well, the fiscal part of this, really there's some in the budget for that. We have transferred some funds to take care of that. We have...there's a one-time \$6 million that comes part of the budget, to help with the community-based services, to help jump-start those. We have another \$2.5 million that is also going to help in developing the EPCs, and that's what Senator Janssen was talking about in his concern,...

SENATOR MINES: Right.

SENATOR JENSEN: ...already on top of the \$1 million that we have from LB 692 for EPC. So we're going to have \$3.5 million annually to support that very, very important system. I'll tell you, if these police officers know where they can take them, know that there's a place for them, we're not going to have law enforcement upset the way they are right now.

SENATOR MINES: But...but let me ask.

SENATOR JENSEN: Sure.

SENATOR MINES: The amendment that you and the loyal opposition worked toward, what might be the fiscal impact of that? Is that a fair question?

SENATOR JENSEN: There will...there should not be any fiscal impact to that whatsoever. The counties will not be putting in any more money. The real fiscal impact comes in that we're going to be able to get about \$9 million in Medicaid money that we've been passing up, up until now.

SENATOR MINES: Right.

SENATOR JENSEN: The state should not put in any more. It should not cost the state any more.
