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passed, then the real work begins because it is going to be a tremendous amount of work to get us there. But at any point in time, if something is not working, all of us in this body are going to know about it: first, the oversight commission, Health and Human Services Committee, then the entire Legislature. And so I think that we're going to have a very good knowledge, much better than we have today, as a matter of fact, on what is going on, how delivery is being taken care of. Perfect system? No, we're not going to be a perfect system. But I, too, have looked at other states. Yes, we've looked at what they've done right and we've also looked at what they've done wrong and, hopefully, that we can avoid those things that haven't worked out right. And that's why I think our oversight committee...or commission, as well as the Health and Human Services Committee following up on this. So there's that old saying that nothing happens in a vacuum, and I don't believe that that's going to happen here. I can't commit...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR JENSEN: ...where we're going to be financially in another couple of years. I hope the worst is behind us. But my biggest concern is what happens through term limits when I'm not here and when you're not here, in another 4.5 years.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: But could you address the idea that if the Exec Board does approve this, if there would be some kind of a informational hearing or something that goes along with it?

SENATOR JENSEN: I'm not on Exec Board. I can't tell Exec Board what do do.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay.

SENATOR JENSEN: But I think certainly they represent the public also. I don't know who is going to be on Exec Board next year.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Right.

SENATOR JENSEN: And we've got three people that will not be on there, we know that.
