SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now I will watch and see what Senator Connealy's amendment, what the fate of that amendment is. I don't know that he should withdraw it. I think he ought to leave it up there so we can talk a while, take some time. I like to do that. And I can't think of a better way to spend it. So I've had my comments on this bill. I've served notice to Senator Baker. And now I will return to my other work. How much time do I have, Mr. President?

SENATOR CUDABACK: About 24 seconds.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I would yield it to Senator Bourne. (Laugh)
