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for you, Senator, because I don't want to hypothesize on that. I just...I don't know for sure.

SENATOR HARTNETT: But what you're trying to do is make it very narrow, that it just deals with...that they're not going to ever give it away. Is that...?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Right. Right.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Yeah. And I got thinking about it as I was listening to the debate, is that, what if, you know, I have the land and then I decide to...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yeah. That's an interesting question. I'll try to find the answer for you.

SENATOR HARTNETT: All right. Thank you, Senator Beutler.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Hartnett. Further discussion on the Beutler amendment, FA3094. Senator Raikes.

SENATOR RAIKES: Thank you, Mr. President, members. Senator Beutler, another comment or two. And really, this is just in...along the lines of my effort to understand it. And again, my understanding of the real purpose of greenbelting is to allow people to continue in production agriculture even though they arrive next to a city or something, or in a situation where the land takes a much higher value in alternate use, and they have not put it into that alternate use, they still plan...they're still farming, so greenbelting is to protect that. And recapture is...I guess I'm not ready to recite all the reasons for recapture, but it's got something to do, I think, with the transition from ag to non-ag use. And the value that it gets taxed at in greenbelting is an ag production value. So again, I think that's the main focus. But let me ask you this. Suppose I decide to...I have a piece of land that's greenbelted, and I decide to donate this land to the city. Exactly how would the green...how would the recapture work, the way the law is right now? I don't know, pick some numbers if you like, if it makes it easier. But let's say that here...here is the title, but there's this greenbelt...or this recapture bill due. Who is
