and bolster those mechanisms that allow people to go to employers here and there with as great an ease as possible, both for the good of the employer who is receiving them, who needs the labor, who needs their enhanced skills, and for the benefit of they themselves, the worker himself or herself, and their families. When a worker makes the effort to improve his or her skills, makes the effort to get more education, but then discovers that there's no job in the area that really takes full advantage of that education and that experience and those acquired skills, they need to move someplace else. And that's good for the country. That's good for the economy. And the mechanism in this bill is what has provided a lot of that mobility and flexibility, and I hope we don't forget that in the discussions that we'll be having mostly this afternoon. Thank you.
