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those kinds of programs. And I think we all know that once an individual is on that type of program, it's difficult for them to get off. And there's really, I guess, in some ways, maybe a disincentive to get off those types of programs. So I think that...I understand why Senator Cunningham is doing this. He's trying to make a better business environment, a better business climate, and as a small businessman, I can absolutely understand why he's doing this. But that doesn't necessarily mean I have to agree with it. I think that it is a little harsh, I think, to make someone wait a full 13 weeks to qualify for benefits. And again, I asked you, I said this on General File, imagine any of us in here, if you didn't have any income for 13 weeks, what would that do to you? You couldn't pay your bills, or at least, speaking for myself, I'd probably lose my house in 13 weeks. And I think the most of us live week to week or month to month, and I think that 13 weeks, which is over three months, with no income coming in the door, and economic times like this, I think it's exceedingly punitive. And that's my opinion. I do want to talk a little bit about Senator Louden's amendment. And I had mentioned...well, we were debating that, that I thought that that would open up the fund to a whole host of applicants. And Senator Louden said that I was using smooth lawyer talk, and he kind of dismissed me. And that's all right. I've got thick skin. But it wasn't necessarily smooth lawyer talk, Senator Louden; it was common sense talk. I got some numbers since then. I'm going to run these by you. We'll see if you don't crawl under the wagon, (laughter) and lick your wounds. (Laugh) In Nebraska, we have 41,000 people over 65 years of age working, 41,000. Now, that does include some ag workers. There are some agriculture workers in there, and those would not be included, and I didn't have the breakdown. So there's...again, working or looking for work, there's 41,000 individuals over the age of 65. And Senator Louden on Select File had said that there's only a hundred and some individuals that qualify for...140 is the number that was given during debate, and that's because an individual's Social Security benefit is used to offset how much they would get in the unemployment, in the event they became unemployed. So again, there's 233,000 Nebraskans over age 65; 41,770 of those individuals over 65 are either working or looking for work. Let me give you another number. The average salary of those over 65 who would qualify for unemployment
