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They're punished to the same extent as those who were fired, not just left voluntarily, but with those who were fired. If they don't go applying for work in a given week when told by the commissioner to do so, they lose 13 weeks; they're disqualified for 13 weeks. He says, well, you're only dealing with people who did something they shouldn't do. The law now is based on...and I'm going to call it a punishment; the disqualification period that is deemed just for people who do whatever is listed in this bill that would result in a disqualification. So for him to stand up there like he does and act like we're seeking something that these workers who are not employed are not entitled to is completely wrong. He was correct when he said his philosophy differs from that of some people on the floor. Well, I'm prepared to deal with every bill after this one. And I'm not going to waste a lot of time going through that. I'm just going to say it maybe 10 or 12 times. Give him a cloture vote. He thinks he's got it; I don't. Show me I'm wrong. And then I start right on the very next bill after this one, and we'll go right down the line, and when one of mine comes up, mine bites the dust too, and I will not ask for cloture. So how are you going to get me off my own bill if I have one that comes up for debate? The Speaker is going to have to say, well, Ernie, I think you've been on your bill long enough, and it's got to go. I say, Mr. Speaker, you must do what you must do, and I shall do what I shall do. This is an atrocious bill. It is unfair to the people about whom I care. And I care more about them than I do Senator Cunningham's feelings, or those hardhearted people that he is carrying water for. I sit on that Business and Labor Committee, and have been sitting on it for several years, and I get a chance to see them come before that committee, these chambers of commerces...these chambers of commerce, and similar types. You talk about hardhearted, two-faced people. Whenever it's something for them, they can put up a pitiful mouth. Then they get somebody like Senator Cunningham, who is a new kid on the block, and if he's not, based on his understanding, he seems to be, to bring something like this. Well, Senator Cunningham, I want you to look. The gloves are coming off. Others have amendments. They may fight them. But I've got plenty of amendments up there. So if he's going to invoke cloture, he'd do you all a favor by invoking it soon. What good does it do to let us debate all day, which
