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talk about saving \$3 million or \$4 million. That's not going to do anything to save this fund. That's not going to do anything at all. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. (Visitors introduced.) On with discussion of the Beutler amendment. Senator Louden.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Legislature. That's why I always enjoy visiting with Senator Bourne, because as a lawyer he's usually a source of enormous misinformation. (Laughter) As he come out with the figures he had is like he would be trying to convince a jury that his...the person he was defending probably didn't do something drastic. But, anyway, according to the workforce book--and this is from the state of Nebraska stuff--in 2002, which is the last year that they have the records for, there were 1,241 unemployment benefit recipients who was receiving Social Security. Now, that's a long ways from 41,000. Just because you're over 65 doesn't mean you're looking for a job. There's several of us over 65 that probably aren't looking for a job, whether we need one or not. But this is...the people I'm talking about are those that work full time, they have to work full time to supplement their income. They're usually down there on the lower scale of the Social Security benefits. If they were on railroad pension, they would be able to receive the unemployment benefits that...at full benefits. If they...the railroad pensions, the veterans pensions, these are all pensions. It just so happens that the Social Security pension is the one that's deleted out of there, or set up in there, that is deducted from their benefits. So this isn't something that there's going to be a whole herd of people hunting for to apply here. They have to be able to work, to hold a full-time job. And I'm sure Pat Bourne has got several years ahead of him before he realizes that he probably won't be able to do a full day's work when he gets about 60--some years old. But let me tell you, when you get up there someplace, yeah, there isn't everybody that can work a full day's work when you're past 65. And I admire those people that are trying to do it. And I think we have to continue to give them the benefit of the doubt and do what we can to help them preserve their freedom and keep them
