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am going to vote for the bracket motion. And what I would suggest to you is to put aside Senator Chambers' rhetoric, forget the fact that he's threatened you and said what he was going to do, because quite honestly, that's not really relevant. I think what you should do when you decide to vote for the bracket motion is, does it make sense to make people wait 13 weeks to receive unemployment insurance. Put aside what Senator Chambers is saying. That really...it's of no consequence. You're not capitulating in any stretch of the imagination. If you think that an individual should wait 13 weeks to receive unemployment compensation, then vote against the bracket motion. If you think the status quo is fair, that an individual already has a penalty, already has to wait 7 to 10 weeks if they leave for no good cause or are fired for misconduct, then vote for the bracket motion, maintain the status quo. Don't buy the arguments for one second that this is going to help that fund. It's not. It's peanuts. It's pennies compared to how short that fund is. This is of no consequence whatsoever. And again, what Senator Cunningham is trying to do is totally offset by what Senator Loudon has done. So put aside Senator Chambers' slash and burn technique, for lack of a better word or phrase, because he's going to do what he's going to do regardless. All I'm saying to you is, if you think people should wait 13 weeks, vote against the bracket motion. If you think the status quo, the 7- to 10-week waiting period, is fair and is the system that we should stay with, vote for the bracket motion. Personally, I'm going to vote for the bracket motion, because I think a 7- to 10-week waiting period is sufficient. That's a sufficient penalty for people who are wrongdoers who are trying to qualify for unemployment insurance. Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Bourne. Senator Stuhr, you're recognized to speak.

SENATOR STUHR: Thank you, Madam President and members of the body. I have not spoken on this issue but I couldn't help but to take a few minutes and look back on the committee statement. And I might say, first off, I am opposed to the bracket motion. But as I look at the committee statement, I see 13 proponents for the bill. I see no opponents. Absolutely no one came in to testify in opposition of this bill. Now to me that sends a
