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where the monies go. In Senator Landis' bill, he is just saying he is going to extend the right to the members of the public to continue to have a voice in where those monies go. But we reserved, with the lottery, the right to determine how it was going to be enacted and the right to regulate it. With the proposals that we have in front of us as petitions, we don't have those rights, and that is what has shifted me from being adamantly opposed to any expansion of gambling to saying, okay, I will look at something that we're in control of because that's what we got elected for, to come down here and be in this body and make those kinds of decisions. The other day there was someone here from Pacific Life who was working...he was interested in one of the bills that we had about Pacific Life, but he had served in the California Legislature, and he was talking about what has happened in California in terms of the environment for business that has happened mostly as a result of initiatives. And he said it so hamstrings that...their legislature to be able to do something to make meaningful but good changes that he couldn't...he decided not to continue in the legislature; that they are in a situation where so much of what...of the activities that should be the purview of legislative elected policymakers are being done through initiatives, and it...that he just didn't really feel like he was able to do the job that he was elected to do. That's what we're going to be faced with. That is my fear. It's a fear that's so great that it has caused me to change my position on what I consider a very serious not only social issue but moral issue, but that's where I am because I believe that we are the ones that have to do it. And I also believe that in the case of this bill, the one that's before us and my amendment, I don't know how you get any closer than to say that lotteries, the lottery is a form of gambling and that casinos are a form of gambling. I don't know how we can have anything more closely related, and I don't know what germaneness is unless it's a relationship between those two things. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Brown. When I recognize you, if your intent is not to speak on germaneness but to speak on the underlying measure you can waive, otherwise I'll go through the lights as they appear. Senator Smith
